"The first hundred years is always the longest." At Kendallville, Ind., last week, A. S. Beau-lieu of the American Income Insurance Company reported accident claims resulting from the injuries of Ben Ogier, La Porte, Ind., who suffered a broken leg and bruises, and D. E. Jones, of Van Wert, Ohio, who sustained a broken collar bone and body bruises following a smash-up when their horses and that of Walter J. Wilson, of Hicksville, Ohio, went down in a mix-up. Wilson also suffered bruises and possible internal injuries. The Scheme, driven by Wilson, died soon after the accident.

Harry Swisshelm was thrown and fractured his jaw during the Washington C. H., Ohio, racing last week following a collision of his mount Vera McKinney with Royal Guy, driven by Earl Smith. Smith was uninjured.

Kashmary, by Mr. McElwyn-Kashmir hung up a new low record for herself last week at Goshen when she won the Progressive purse in 2:02½ with the half in :59½, last quarter in :28½, beating a select field of seven.

The records for the year are still without a new two-minute performer or one that has beaten or equalled that mark.

The Lexington Trots

Lexington, Ky., Aug. 23.—Roy Miller, secretary of the Kentucky Trotting Horse Breeders' Association, announces the full program for the Lexington Trots this week. This is the closing meeting of the Grand Circuit, September 18 to 23, and the list of events is one which every horseman anticipates with pleasure.

Racing consumes the week from Monday until Friday, with Saturday reserved for postponements. Ten class events are still open and do not close until September 4. These include the 18 pace, handicap trot, 12 pace, 17 trot, 15 trot, 21 pace, 20 trot, 15 pace, 12 trot and handicap pace.

Purses in the open events range in value from \$400 to \$500 and there is a race for every horse, with some of the events barring winners of 1933 on the Grand Circuit.

Iowa State Fair Program

Des Moines, Iowa, Aug. 23.—The largest number of entries that has ever been recorded is listed for the Iowa State Fair at Des Moines, which will race August 28 to 31.

In the late closing classes the entries are: In the 2:16 pace, 21; 2:19 pace, 35; in the 2:24 trot, 27; in the 2:24 pace, 30; in the 2:19 trot, 23; other late events are correspondingly well filled, and the fair management is remodeling several new barns to accommodate the stables.

Musclestone 2:06½, by Mr. McElwyn-Ruth M. Chenault claims the fastest mile to date trotted by a two-year-old but Bertha C. Hanover 2:07 is the leading money collector of that age.
